Our Cities - Our Pride District Rahim Yar Khan

Rahim Yar Khan, located in the southern region of Punjab, Pakistan, serves as a pivotal district in the province. Positioned strategically along the national highway and the railway line, it acts as a conduit between the provinces of Sindh and Punjab. The district is bordered by the Indus River to the west, which plays a significant role in its agricultural landscape, and by the Thar Desert to the east, influencing its climate and terrain. The history of Rahim Yar Khan is rich and varied, with its origins dating back to ancient civilizations. It was once part of the Indus Valley Civilization and has seen the influence of various dynasties and empires, including the Maurya, Kushan, Gupta, and Mughal empires. It has been renamed several times over the last 5,000 years. The earliest recorded name was AROR or ALOR, and then it became City of Pattan, Phul Wada, Noshehra and now Rahim Yar Khan. The ancient tower of Pattan Minara stands 8 km to the south of the city in its original form. Arabs ruled the vast areas of Punjab including Rahim Yar Khan Region. Rahim



Yar Khan region was part of Multan province of Mughal Empire. In 1881, Nawab of Bahawalpur gave the city its current name by naming it after his first-born son and crown prince Rahim Yar Khan.


Spanning an area of 11,880 square kilometers, Rahim Yar Khan is divided into four tehsils: Rahim Yar Khan, Sadiqabad, Khanpur, and Liaqatpur with 139 union councils and 940 km of road network. These tehsils comprise both rural and metropolitan regions, each with its own unique characteristics and developmental needs. The district's urban centers are growing rapidly, with increasing migration from rural areas in search of better opportunities. The Indus River, which flows along the western boundary of Rahim Yar Khan, is the lifeline of the district's agriculture and 0.717 million livestock. The fertile plains nurtured by the river support a variety of crops, including wheat, cotton, sugarcane, and rice. The

region is also known for its fruit orchards, particularly mangoes and citrus fruits, which contribute significantly to the local economy.



Rahim Yar Khan's industrial sector is gradually expanding, with a focus on agro-based industries. The district hosts 362 industrial units including 77 flour mills, 06 sugar mills, 03 textile units, 02 fertilizer companies and 01 auto manufacturing unit as well. Rahim Yar Khan industrial estate is the hub of economic activity, providing employment opportunities to the local population. A substantial portion of the workforce is engaged in agriculture and related industries. However, the district is witnessing a shift towards more diversified economic activities, with increasing opportunities in the service sector and small-scale manufacturing. The local government is also investing in skill development programs to enhance employability among the youth.

Education remains a key focus area in Rahim Yar Khan. The district has a literacy rate of approximately 59%, with concerted efforts being made to improve educational infrastructure and access. Numerous public and private educational institutions are operational, offering primary to tertiary education which include 3,102 schools and 14 colleges. Vocational training Institutes, like those






Our Cities - Our Pride District Rahim Yar Khan

established by the Punjab Vocational Training Council (PVTC), play a crucial role in equipping the youth with practical skills.

Total population of Rahim Yar Khan is 4.808 million (Male: 2,461,780 Female: 2,345,413 Transgender: 569). 1,845,191 (38.4%) out of Rahim Yar Khan's total population falls within the age bracket of 15 to 40 years. This demographic group is critical for the district's socioeconomic development. PVTC has taken many youthfocused initiatives with a prominent presence of 09 VTIs in the district producing 43,396 skilled men and women.

Long ago, there was a farmer who had problems. He was advised to go and see the wise old man of the village, who would help him sort his life out. The wise old man asked him why he had come. "I'm a farmer," he said. "I love farming, but the problem is that sometimes there's no rain, and we really struggle those years. Of course, sometimes we have the other problem, and there's too much rain and the floods destroy everything." But the man didn't stop there.

"I also have a wife. I love her, truly, but sometimes we don't get on. To be honest, occasionally, she gets on my nerves. And my kids! They're lovely kids. They're great. "Well, I can maybe help you with your eighty-fourth problem," he said.



Sadra Akbar VTI Jamal Din Wali


