




#### MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIRMAN PVTC

#### **BAITHAK & BEYOND** MR. KHALID MASOOD CHAUDHARY

Thank you so much sir, for sparing the time for "Baithak & Beyond". To begin with, could you please share a brief overview of your childhood dreams and educational background?

Thank you for the opportunity. Growing up, my family's strong legal background instilled in me a deep sense of responsibility toward society. I pursued my early education at PAF College Sargodha and later completed my LLB from Punjab University in 1983. It was during this time that I realized that serving the public through the Civil Services would be the most effective way to contribute toward resolving grassroots-level issues, which led me to join the Pakistan Administrative Service in 1984.

With over 34 years of experience in the Pakistan Administrative Service, you've held multiple key positions. Can you share some of the most defining moments from your career, particularly those that shaped your leadership philosophy?

My posting as Assistant Commissioner in Bannu, DI Khan and Chitral were some of the most formative years of my career. Later on, in civil service working closely with communities, I witnessed the importance of leadership that is both empathetic and decisive. These experiences shaped my philosophy of civil service, where every single decision can be made for the well-being of the people.

What inspired you to take on the role of Chairman at PVTC following your tenure at PPSC? How do you see this role aligning with your passion for public service?

After my tenure at PPSC, I felt a strong pull towards contributing to the vocational sector, an area where I had previously worked as the Regional Director of NAVTTC. I saw this role at PVTC as a natural extension of my passion for public service and a chance to apply my experience in enhancing vocational training, which I believe is crucial for Pakistan's socio-economic development.

Under your leadership, what strategic priorities are you focusing on to enhance vocational training and skills development in Punjab?

We are focusing on sustainability, enhancing publicprivate partnerships, and aligning our curricula with industry needs. Our aim is to ensure that vocational training not only meets the current demands of the labor market but also prepares our youth for future technological advancements.

How has your experience across various departments influenced your leadership style, and how do you apply this to guide PVTC towards its mission?

My experience across various departments, particularly in education and governance, has taught me the importance

of adaptability and forward-thinking. At PVTC, I strive to foster a culture of continuous learning and innovation, encouraging our team to think creatively while keeping the needs of the public at the forefront.

What are some of the challenges you've faced since joining PVTC, and how do you plan to address them?

The major challenge has been financial sustainability due to a lack of infrastructure and funds. However, with the Chief Minister's commitment to resolving these financial issues, I am confident we will overcome this phase. We are working on increasing our outreach to the private sector and ensuring that PVTC remains an agile, industryresponsive organization.

On the flip side, what opportunities do you see for growth and innovation in the vocational sector?

The vocational sector holds immense potential for innovation, especially in integrating new technologies and expanding our training programs. We aim to tap into global best practices and modernize our training methods to make PVTC a leader in skill development in the region. How does PVTC plan to incorporate sustainability into its operations and ensure inclusivity in its training programs, particularly for marginalized communities in Punjab?

PVTC is committed to ensuring inclusivity by expanding our outreach to marginalized communities. We are also focusing on sustainable practices within our training programs, ensuring that our graduates are equipped with skills relevant to both the local and international job markets.

Are there any international models or best practices in vocational training that you believe PVTC can adopt to enhance the quality and relevance of its training programs?

Countries like China, Malaysia, and India have successfully leveraged vocational training to boost their economies. Especially China has overtaken Japan as the 2nd most powerful economy and it all happened only by enhancing the productivity in manufacturing and developing expertise in IT sector. Both the streams are product of vocational and technical education. We are exploring models to enhance the quality and relevance of our programs. Incorporating cutting-edge technologies and work-based training will be key components of our strategy.

How do you view the role of vocational training in contributing to Pakistan's socio-economic development? What impact do you envision PVTC having in the next five years?

Vocational training is the quickest and most effective way to uplift Pakistan's economy. In the next five years, as i said earlier, I envision PVTC playing a pivotal role in transforming the TVET sector by producing a workforce that not only meets local industry demands but also contributes to the global economy.

## PVTC has been actively forming partnerships with industry leaders and institutions. What role do you believe such collaborations play in advancing vocational training in the region?

Partnerships with industry leaders and institutions like industrial estates along with Chambers of Commerce & Industries across Punjab are essential for aligning our training programs with market needs. These collaborations allow us to continuously improve our curricula and provide our trainees with real-world skills that are directly applicable in the industry.

As the Chairman of PVTC, how do you envision the future of the TVET (Technical and Vocational Education and Training) sector in Punjab, particularly in light of the evolving job market and technological

#### advancements?



The session aimed to strengthen industry collaboration, Labor Market, Digitalization and Gender - GIZ Pakistan, provided an overview of the TVET Sector Support Program. At the same time, Mr. Wagas Waheed, Sustainability and Partnerships Advisor GIZ Pakistan, introduced the OJT Model to the industry and discussed Cooperation Agreements



identify skill gaps, boosting industry participation, and develop actionable strategies. In his opening remarks, Mian Rashid Igbal, President of Multan Chamber of Commerce and Industry emphasized the need for PVTC to design training courses that meet current industry demands and enhance workforce quality. He also expressed the industry's to establish Work Based Training and OJT pathway between PVTC and industry partners. The session focused on identifying sector-specific trades for OJT, including the duration, opportunities, gender considerations, and other factors tailored to the industry's needs in Multan, under MCCI's guidance. #### RPL AND NVQF REGISTRARY **AWARENESS SESSIONS**

In September 2024, the 'Reintegration of Returnees in Pakistan' component TVET Sector the Support Programme organized a series of orientation sessions at various VTIs under PVTC. These sessions took place in Bahawalpur, Multan, Gujrat, Rawalpindi and Faisalabad, targeting Admin & Accounts Officers, Admission and Placement Officers and staff involved in Recognition of Prior Learning (RPL) trades. The primary objective was to equip these individuals with the necessary skills and knowledge to provide RPL support for Pakistani returnees from Germany, the European Union, and the Gulf Cooperation Council (GCC) countries. The initiative aims to address the needs of both returnees and local communities, with a project goal of ensuring that 60% of the beneficiaries are returnees and 40% are locals. Comprehensive assessments are scheduled to be completed before the end of 2024, focusing on creating supportive environment reintegration.

gender-inclusive is particularly significant in its commitment to digitization and prioritizing female beneficiaries, with a target of 30% participation from women and overall 50% assessemnts will be conducted in IT-related trades. By leveraging the ROR Project, PVTC plans to conduct RPL assessments for approximately 600-700 candidates across various RPL centers. This effort is not only about skill certification but also aims to enhance the livelihood prospects of both returnees and locals, fostering sustainability and economic development within the region. Through these initiatives, the program seeks to create a positive impact on the lives of individuals, enabling them to gain recognition for their skills and improve their opportunities in the labour market.

### OUR CITIES - OUR PRIDE DISTRICT LODHRAN

Lodhran, a district located in the southern part of Punjab, Pakistan, is known for its agricultural heritage, rich history, and strategic geographical importance. Bordered by the Sutlej River to the north and surrounded by key districts like Multan, Bahawalpur, and Vehari, Lodhran serves as a vital hub for agricultural production, with crops like wheat, cotton, sugarcane, and mangoes being its major outputs. The district, along with its three tehsils—Lodhran, Kehror Pacca, and Dunyapur has witnessed significant social and economic developments over the years. Lodhran covers a total area of 691,115 acres, of which 599,457 acres are cultivated. This agricultural foundation is supported by an extensive road network of 2,252 kilometers and 60 canals, with the Mailsi canal being the most prominent. Lodhran is home to a population of approximately 1.7 million people, with a near-equal gender distribution: 0.86 million males and 0.83 million females. The district is divided into 70 union councils and 436 villages, reflecting its predominantly rural makeup. The average household size is around 8 persons, with 262,650 household units in




total. The major ethnic groups in Lodhran include Lodhra, Awan, Rajpur Kanju, Baloch, Arain, Jat, Bhatti, Syed, Joiya, Noon, Tareen, Ghallu, Malik, and Jhandeer. The district's population primarily speaks Urdu, Sariki, and Punjabi.

Lodhran boasts a rich historical and cultural heritage, with several archaeological sites and shrines. Among the notable archaeological sites are the Ruins of Taiwat and Tilwara towns located near Haveli Naseer Khan in Tehsil Lodhran. Lodhran was split off as a separate district from Multan in 1991. It has the lowest Human Development Index of all districts in Punjab.

In this context, the Punjab Vocational Training Council (PVTC) has emerged as a game changer, empowering the youth of Lodhran and its surrounding districts by equipping them with the technical skills needed to succeed in today's job market. The establishment of Vocational Training Institutes (VTIs) in Lodhran, Dunyapur, and

Makhdoom Aali has provided the local population with access to high-quality vocational education and training, significantly improving the employment prospects of thousands of individuals. Lodhran's economy, which



has traditionally relied on agriculture, faces several challenges, including unpredictable weather patterns, water shortages, and fluctuations in global commodity prices. These factors have made it increasingly important for the district to diversify its economy, with a particular focus on industrialization and the development of a skilled workforce. The youth of Lodhran, especially those from rural and underprivileged backgrounds, have struggled to find stable employment, often due to a lack of technical skills that are increasingly in demand in today's industrialized world. To address this issue, the PVTC has played a crucial role in establishing VTIs across the district which are designed to provide practical, handson training in a range of trades, enabling individuals to acquire the skills needed to secure employment in both the local and international job markets.

Established on July 1, 2006, VTI Lodhran has become a cornerstone of vocational education and training in the district. Since its inception, the institute has offered a wide array of courses including Computer Operator, Heat Ventilation & Air Conditioning (HVAC), General Electrician, Dress Making, Computer Hardware and

Network Professional, and Clinical Assistant. One of the most significant achievements of VTI Lodhran has been securing sponsorship from Overseas Pakistanis for two key trades—General Electrician and HVAC. This sponsorship, amounting to Rs. 2.88 million, has provided the institute with the financial resources needed to



improve the quality of its training programs and achieve self-sustainability. To date, VTI Lodhran has produced 7,295 graduates, with a placement ratio of 68.45%. This means that nearly 70% of the institute's graduates have found gainful employment in various sectors, including construction, healthcare, IT, and manufacturing.

Another key player in the vocational training landscape of Lodhran district is VTI Dunyapur, which was established on May 23, 2003. VTI Dunyapur offers a variety of trades that cater to the needs of both the local and national job markets, including Computer Operator, Clinical Assistant, Dress Making, General Electrician, and Beautician. With 3,704 graduates and a placement ratio of 66%, VTI Dunyapur has played a pivotal role in uplifting the socio-



economic status of its trainees.

Located in the vicinity of Lodhran, SVTI Makhdoom Aali was established on January 1, 2005, with the goal of providing vocational training to the underserved rural population. The institute offers courses in trades such as

Computer Operator, Dress Making, and Refrigeration & Air Conditioning. VTI Makhdoom Aali has made significant strides in expanding access to vocational training for individuals who might otherwise be left behind. The establishment of VTIs in the district has had a profound impact on the local economy. By providing individuals with the skills needed to secure employment in high-demand trades, these institutes have not only improved the earning potential of their pass outs but have also contributed to the district's economic diversification.

The success of the vocational training programs offered by VTIs in Lodhran, Dunyapur, and Makhdoom Aali highlights the importance of vocational training in today's rapidly evolving job market. As more and more industries shift towards automation and digitalization, the demand for skilled labor will only continue to grow. By equipping individuals with the skills needed to meet this demand, PVTC is helping to ensure that the youth of Lodhran are well-prepared for the future. As these institutes continue to expand their offerings and improve their training programs, the future looks bright for the youth of Lodhran, who now have the skills and knowledge needed to thrive in today's competitive job market.




#### **MEETINGS WITH DELEGATIONS FROM ASIAN DEVELOPMENT BANK & IWRPP**





Delegation from the Asian Development Bank (ADB) Pakistan recently visited PVTC, engaging in productive discussions with its management. This meeting highlighted the critical role of PVTC as a major stakeholder in the Technical and Vocational Education and Training (TVET) sector in Punjab. The discussions primarily focused on the Improving Workforce Readiness Punjab Project (IWRPP), which aims to enhance the employability of the workforce in the Pakistan. #### POTATOES, EGGS AND COFFEE

A daughter complained to her father that her life was miserable and that she didn't know how she was going to make it. She was tired of fighting and struggling all the time. It seemed just as one problem was solved, another one soon followed. Her father, a chef, took her to the kitchen. He filled three pots with water and placed each on a high fire. Once the three pots began to boil, he placed potatoes in one pot, eggs in the second pot, and ground coffee beans in the third pot.

He then let them sit and boil, without saying a word to his daughter. The daughter, moaned and impatiently waited, wondering what he was doing. After twenty minutes he turned off the burners. He took the potatoes out of the pot and placed them in a bowl. He pulled the eggs out and placed them in a bowl. He then ladled the coffee out and placed it in a cup. Turning to her he asked. "Daughter, what do you see?"

"Potatoes, eggs, and coffee," she hastily replied.

"Look closer," he said, "and touch the potatoes." She did and noted that they were soft. He then asked her to take an egg and break it. After pulling off the

shell, she observed the hard-boiled egg. Finally, he asked her to sip the coffee. Its rich aroma brought a smile to her face. "Father, what does this mean?" she asked. He then explained that the potatoes, the eggs and coffee beans had each faced the same adversity; the boiling water. However, each one reacted differently. The potato went in strong, hard, and unrelenting, but in boiling water, it became soft and weak. The egg was fragile, with the thin outer shell protecting its liquid interior until it was put in the boiling water. Then the inside of the egg became hard.
