

### **BAITHAK & BEYOND** MR. M. KHALID BARI - PRESIDENT DBOM KASUR

#### Mr. Bari, tell us about your early life, education?

I come from the industrious town of Pattoki, a place that has always been close to my heart. My roots are deeply grounded in a business-oriented family. I got my early education from Pattoki and later moved to Lahore to pursue a Bachelor's in Commerce from the prestigious Hailey College of Commerce.

#### What inspired you to step into the world of business?

Even as a student, my mind was set - I had always dreamed of expanding my family business and transforming it with modern practices. My father was a well-known oil and cotton trader, and I wished to carry that legacy forward - not by repeating the past, but by evolving it. That's when I decided to venture into the rice industry. In the early 80s, I laid the foundation of Punjab Rice Mills in Kasur – and I never looked back.

#### Your contributions to the business world are vast, but you've also dedicated yourself to the education and training sectors. What fuels that commitment?

Business and education, to me, go hand in hand. While I'm deeply involved in the rice milling industry, I have also always believed in creating sustainable change through knowledge. That's why I'm running Punjab College, Jaranwala Branch and American Lyceum School in Pattoki. My roles as former President of the Rice Mill Association Kasur, Executive Member of REAP, and Executive Director at LCCI gave me an opportunity to work at policy levels. I also served as Executive Member DBOM Okara in TEVTA. These platforms taught me that without education and skills, no nation can progress. As President DBOM Kasur under PVTC, I see my role as a bridge between industry and skilled manpower - and I'm determined to make that bridge stronger every day.

#### Being a pioneer in Kasur's rice mill industry, how do you view the evolving industrial landscape, and what role should PVTC play in it?

Kasur's industrial identity is shifting. Traditionally known for its tanneries and agriculture, the region is now witnessing a boom in textile and garment industries. Numerous stitching units are emerging, which is a golden opportunity for PVTC.

What courses do you think PVTC may offer to cope

#### with ever evolving global demand of skilled work force?

We cannot ignore the global trend toward IT. PVTC needs to embrace advanced courses like Database Management, Al-integrated IT skills, and Data Analytics to prepare our youth for the digital economy. Another overlooked area is Industrial Electricians - a skill in high demand both locally and overseas. Vocational training must not just be relevant – it must be visionary.

#### How do you see your role as President DBOM, and what's your vision for VTIs under your jurisdiction?

My mission is simple - maximize the impact of vocational training. I want every pass-out of PVTC to walk out with not just a certificate, but confidence, professionalism, and real-world readiness. We are working to enhance grooming activities, organize industry linkages, mock interviews, and mentoring sessions. I'm also actively pursuing the relocation of SVTI Pattoki to a purpose-built building to ensure a conducive environment for learning. Furthermore, I believe in expanding the range and level of trades offered at VTIs - we must introduce Level-4 NVQFs and trades that sync with emerging markets. Short courses are a great initiative, but to ensure greater access, the fee structure must be revisited - lower fees will mean more trained youth.

#### You've travelled widely for business. What lessons can Pakistani industries learn from developed nations?

Indeed, I've had the opportunity to visit many developed countries, and the difference is glaring - it's technology and innovation. Our industries still lack automation, process efficiency, and product refinement. While the workforce is hardworking, our technological gap and rigid tax policies, along with sky-high electricity rates, are major hurdles. These issues not only impact productivity but also cripple exports, worsening our balance of payments. We must modernize our industrial setup if we are to compete globally.

#### What's your opinion on the recent release of funds to **PVTC** by the Government of Punjab?

This was a much-needed and highly commendable step. Releasing the long-awaited funds to PVTC reflects that the Government has finally prioritized



the skill sector – and rightly so! These funds will help bridge infrastructure gaps, procure tools and equipment, and improve the overall quality of training. A well-funded skill sector is the backbone of foreign remittance inflows, and ultimately, a stable economy. Our pass-outs are playing a critical role in international labour markets.

### Outside your professional life, what are your passions?

Traveling is my therapy. I'm especially drawn to hilly and mountainous regions, with the Northern Areas of Pakistan being my favourite destination. Nature teaches humility, patience, and reflection – all key traits of a leader.

### What message would you like to give to the youth of Pakistan?


Pakistan is not just our country - it's our identity, our

### **OUR CITIES - OUR PRIDE DISTRICT LAYYAH**

Rooted between the mighty Indus River and the Thal Desert, District Layyah-established as a separate district in 1982-is a land of resilience, tradition, and emerging potential. With a historical lineage tracing back to the Mughal and British eras, Layyah has evolved from an agrarian settlement into a promising landscape for vocational transformation, particularly for its vibrant youth population.

Covering an area of 6,291 square kilometers, Layyah is administratively divided into three tehsils: Layyah, Karor Lal Esan, and Choubara, encompassing 44 Union Councils. According to estimates, the population of Layyah as per 2017 census is 1,823,995 (Male: 924,837, Female: 762,232, Transgender 142), with over 60% falling within the 16-35 age bracket, a demographic segment rich in energy, potential, and hunger for opportunity especially in TVET sector. This young population represents a powerful engine for economic growth, provided they are equipped with market-driven skills and employment pathways—a vision perfectly aligned with PVTC's mission of empowering through vocational training.



Layyah's economy is primarily agrarian, with major crops including wheat, sugarcane, cotton, and pulses. The district's semi-arid climate brings scorching summers and mild winters, making it ideal for seasonal crop rotation and livestock rearing. However, the limited industrial footprint poses challenges to sustainable livelihoods.

The services sector, particularly in education, health, and small-scale retail, has witnessed gradual growth. But the lack of technical skills among youth restricts their upward mobility in both local and external markets, a gap which PVTC is committed to bridge.



While predominantly agrarian, District Layyah hosts a modest yet diverse industrial base that supports its agricultural economy. The district is home to 1 sugar mill, 1 vegetable ghee factory, 1 ghee mill, 13 rice factories, 13 flour mills, 21 oil mills, 24 cotton ginning factories, 31 ice factories, and 5 cold storages. Additionally, 183 brick kilns operate across the district, contributing significantly to the local construction sector.

Although small in scale, these industries provide essential employment and offer avenues for technical workforce integration—an opportunity PVTC continues to capitalize on through its industry-aligned training programs.

Recognizing the needs of the region, PVTC has developed a strong institutional presence across Layyah, offering skill-based training through four strategically located Vocational Training Institutes (VTIs). These institutes offer market-relevant courses designed to equip youth, especially from marginalized and rural backgrounds, with the skills necessary to secure employment or launch their own enterprises.


### THE EMPTY CUP

### **SKY IS THE LIMIT**



Born into a humble family in Layyah, Usama Rehman knew hardship from an early age. With limited means and opportunities, he followed in his father's footsteps—working as a daily wage laborer after completing middle school. Each day was a test of survival. Dreams, if any, felt distant and unreachable. But life began to shift the day Usama noticed an admission advertisement for VTI Layyah. A kind teacher encouraged him to apply for the Motorcycle Mechanic course. With unwavering determination, Usama completed his training in February 2021. And then, as if destiny had been waiting, Atlas Honda recruited him directly from the institute. Today, he proudly works in manufacturing unit of Atlas Honda Sheikhupura, earning between Rs. 60,000–70,000 per month, including overtime. Yet, his biggest achievement goes beyond his own career—Usama used his earnings to buy a rickshaw for his father, relieving him from the back-breaking labor he endured for years.

The rickshaw not only provided his father with a more sustainable and dignified income, but also symbolized the generational shift vocational training made possible. "We come from nothing... but VTI Layyah gave us everything—skills, hope, and dignity. May Allah bless such institutions that light the way for families like ours," says Usama with heartfelt gratitude. Usama's story is not just a tale of personal success—it is a testament to the socio-economic transformation vocational training brings to thousands of youth across Punjab. With a skilled hand and a hopeful heart, he has broken the cycle of poverty and carved out a better future—not just for himself, but for his entire family.



There was a time when Muhammad Mohsin Raza stood at the crossroads of uncertainty, matriculation in hand, dreams in his heart, but no clear path ahead. Like many youth in Layyah, he longed for a future with dignity, stability, and purpose. That future began to take shape when he learned about admissions at Vocational Training Institute Layyah. Guided by instinct and hope, he enrolled in the Computer Operator trade. The one-year certificate equipped Mohsin with the skills to confidently perform office-based IT tasks, and a subsequent two-month on-the-job training opportunity deepened his professional experience. Soon after the completion of his training, he applied for a position at Layyah Sugar Mills and got hired on basis of strong typing speed, solid training, and self-assurance. But Mohsin's ambitions didn't end there.

While working, he pursued further education and attained Bachelor's degree. His dedication bore fruit when he was selected as a Computer Operator at the Passport Office Layyah, a prestigious role in the government sector. The pinnacle of his journey came in 2021, when vacancies for Patwari were announced. A computer diploma was mandatory—something Mohsin proudly held. After clearing a competitive test, he was appointed as a Patwari in the Land Revenue Department—a position of public trust and responsibility.

"It all started with that one decision—to walk through the doors of VTI Layyah. The skills I gained there became my foundation. I'm forever grateful to the dedicated instructors and the vision of this institution that lifted me from uncertainty to purpose," says Mohsin, filled with gratitude.
